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1.0 Introduction

This annual report has been prepared by Sinosteel Midwest Corporation Ltd (SMC) for the Koolanooka/Blue Hills Direct Shipping Iron Ore Mining Project (the Project). This report is provided in accordance with Condition 3 of Approval Decision 2007/3809, published by the then Federal Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts (DEWHA), now the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment (AWE), on 4 January 2010.

The Project is located in the Midwest region of Western Australia (WA), within the Shires Morawa and Perenjori. The closest towns are Perenjori and Morawa while the largest regional town, Geraldton, is approximately 300 km north-west.

Commencement of the action occurred at the Koolanooka mine on 2 April 2010. This is the eleventh annual report submitted for the Project and covers the period April 2020 to March 2021.

SMC is committed to ensuring all its activities comply with statutory requirements as a minimum and are undertaken so that adverse environmental impacts are avoided or appropriately managed.

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3.0 Project background

The Koolanooka mine was the first stage of SMC's Koolanooka/Blue Hills Project and is located approximately 180kms south-east of Geraldton and 20kms east of the Morawa township. The Blue Hills component of the project, which encompasses the Mungada East and Mungada West pits, located a further 60kms east of Koolanooka. Both Projects are currently in Care and Maintenance.

At Koolanooka, operations comprised of mining the South-fold Cutback; a small extension to the existing pit previously mined in the 1960s and 70s and mining of the Detritals pit, a shallow extension of between 10 - 35 m on the south-western flank of the existing Koolanooka pit.




Figure 1: Koolanooka Mine Site Layout

Ore was crushed and screened on site and transported by road train to Geraldton Port for storage and shipment. All waste rock generated was either backfilled into the existing Koolanooka pit or placed in nearby waste dumps. Mining did not extend below the water table. The layout of the Koolanooka project area is shown in Figure 1.

The Blue Hills mine consisted of extending the two previously mined pits (being Mungada East and Mungada West). The pits were mined by Western Mining Corporation (WMC) in the early 1970's. Processing and transport of ore was similar to Koolanooka. Mining operations commenced at Blue Hills in 2013 and ceased in 2015 when the site was placed into care and maintenance. SMC has received state government approval to expand its operations at Blue Hills in the form of Ministerial Statement 1071 (Blue Hills Mungada East Expansion Project). The Blue Hills Mungada East Expansion was referred to AWE on the 2 October 2019 (Referral No. 2019/8591), and a decision of not a controlled action was determined on the 6 March 2020.




Figure 2: Blue Hills Mine Site Layout

The updated project layout is shown in Figure 2.

4.0 Land offset progress

On the 8 December 2017, SMC received a *Variation to Conditions Attached to Approval* for EPBC 2007/3809. Condition 1 of EPBC 2007/3809 was amended to extend the time by which a specified parcel of land (being 5,270 ha in size) had to be formally reserved by the Western Australian government under the *Land Administration Act 1994* (WA). The original date by which the land had to be reserved was extended from 4 January 2015 to 1 January 2023.

Condition 3 of EPBC 2007/3809 requires SMC to report on the progress towards formal reservation of the land. To date, SMC surrendered the relevant tenure in 2011, allowing for a Section 19 under the *Mining Act 1978* to be placed over the area. The Section 19 application restricts mining activities, however, does not place the area under formal reservation status.

In consultation with the WA state government, the Section 19 area is part of a larger formal conservation reservation program through the Karara block area. SMC shall continue to consult with the relevant departments to support the finalisation of the formal conservation over this offset area.



5.0 Project status

Mining activity ceased at Koolanooka in 2013. The majority of SMC's Koolanooka mining disturbance has been rehabilitated and seeded with the remainder to be completed once all facilities are removed.

SMC suspended Blue Hills operations in May 2015, pending approvals for an expansion of operations. Operations have since resumed on December 2020. Areas not planned to be reused for future mining have been rehabilitated.
